






Our practice of closed communion is the historic practice of the church. It is prompted by love, both for God's Word and for God's people. It does not deny that members of other denominations are Christians. Rather, it bows the knee to the Bible's deep concern for doctrinal truth (Rom. 16:17) and the Bible's witness that doctrinal unity is central to the common reception of this sacrament. For this reason, quests who desire to commune are asked to speak with the pastor before the service.





WELCOME! We invite all visitors to sign the guest register in the narthex and worship with us again. If you are not a first time visitor and are not communing, please complete the card located with communion cards in front of the pews. If you have questions about how to join our church or study the Scriptures with us, please speak with one of our Elders or the Pastor.

Each Saturday evening from 6-8PM Pastor Rappe avails himself for private confession and absolution that which the historical Lutheran Church refers to as the third Sacrament. This is made available to those whose consciences are burdened and whose hearts are troubled. No one is forced to make private confession, as no one is forced to Baptism or the Holy Supper. Rather, this is the means of God's gospel to those who seek Him and the forgiveness of sins in Jesus.

St. Luke, Evangelist—October 18

Luke was a Gentile physician, a follower of Christ, and a companion of Paul. Little else is known of his life. The two volume work, the third gospel and Acts, is attributed to him. Tradition says that he was perhaps the other disciple with Cleopas on the road to Emmanus, that he was a painter, that he preached in Bithynia, and that he died at the age of 84 in Boetia. He is commemorated in both East and West on October 18. His symbol is a winged ox, suggested by Ezekiel 1:1-10 and 10:8-14.

ST. JAMES, THE BROTHER OF JESUS, OCT. 23

The traditional Western identification of James, the brother of the Lord, with James the Younger (the Less) is rejected by nearly all New Testament scholars, since there is no evidence in the gospels that Jesus' brother was a disciple until he became a witness to the resurrection. The Eastern church commemorates James on this date and the festival has been accepted by several Anglican calendars. St. Paul and the book of Acts both testify to James's presence in the church at Jerusalem and his diplomatic resolution of the dispute between Jew and Gentile at the Council of Jerusalem (Galatians 2: Acts 15). According to church traditions and the Jewish historian Josephus, he was stoned to death, c. 62


