






Our practice of closed communion is the historic practice of the church. It is prompted by love, both for God's Word and for God's people. It does not deny that members of other denominations are Christians. Rather, it bows the knee to the Bible's deep concern for doctrinal truth (Rom. 16:17) and the Bible's witness that doctrinal unity is central to the common reception of this sacrament. For this reason, guests who desire to commune are asked to speak with the pastor before the service.





WELCOME! We invite all visitors to sign the guest register in the narthex and worship with us again. If you are not a first time visitor and are not communing, please complete the card located with communion cards in front of the pews. If you have questions about how to join our church or study the Scriptures with us, please speak with one of our Elders or the Pastor.

Each Saturday evening from 6-8PM Pastor Rappe avails himself for private confession and absolution, that which the historical Lutheran Church refers to as the third Sacrament. This is made available to those whose consciences are burdened and whose hearts are troubled. No one is forced to make private confession, as no one is forced to Baptism or the Holy Supper. Rather, this is the means of God's gospel to those who seek Him and the forgiveness of sins in Jesus.




HOLY GOSPEL LUKE 14: 1-11

The first societies (sewing circles for the seminaries) were organized in the 1850s. In the early 1900s, area auxiliaries were formed for Lutheran hospitals and charities.

Achievements of the societies were so beneficial that not only the women but also a number of pastors and district officials envisioned the establishment of a Synod wide women's league. Beginning in 1928 several attempts were me to organize the league. When the promoters failed to achieve synodical approval, efforts focused on organization at the district level.

Responding to memorials (resolutions) from two of these district groups, the 1938 synodical convention established a committee to study "the problem." It's 1941 report was favorable, and the Synod not only approved but encouraged the creation of a general organization of women. Five pastors were appointed to arrange a meeting of representatives from interested districts.

At a meeting, July 7-8, 1942, at St. Stephen Church, Chicago, the Lutheran Women's Missionary League was founded by delegates from 15 districts. Today it is active in every district of The Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod and the Lutheran Church-Canada and has set a pattern for similar organizations all over the world.

The official colors of the Lutheran Women's Missionary League are purple and gold. According to the Southern Illinois Lutheran Women's Quarterly Supplement, October 1948, the Southern Illinois district was the first to adopt the colors of purple symbolizing royalty, and gold, symbolizing value an integrity.

The LWML Executive Board officially adopted purple and gold at their board meeting held on July 24, 1951, at the Commodore Hotel in New York City.

What Is LWML Sunday

Traditionally, the first LWML Sunday is set aside for the observation of LWML Sunday, but it may be celebrated at any time. Here are some interacting facts according to the LWML history book (*Women In God's Service, WINGS*).

During the 12th Biennial Convention in Washington, D.C., July 18-20, 1967 (Eula Hankel, President), a resolution was passed designating the first Sunday in October as LWML Sunday. On Sunday, October 1, 1967, the first LWML Sunday was held. A letter to all pastors and societies was released to explain that "LWML was to be a window through which could be seen the marvelous opportunities the Lord gives women of the church to be in mission and serve in His Name." Pastors were asked to have a prayer for LWML, and some prayer thoughts were included.

What is the "baptismal font"?

As St. Paul says in Titus: "He saved us, not because of works done by us in righteousness, but according to his own mercy, by the washing of regeneration and renewal of the Holy Spirit, whom he poured out on us richly through Jesus Christ our Savior, so that being justified by his grace we might become heirs according to the hope of eternal life" (Titus 3:5-7). This all happens at the baptismal font.

Why do we use a baptismal font?

Baptism is important in the lives of God's people. In Baptism you were given the forgiveness of sins, rescued from death and the devil, and given salvation. All of this comes to you through God's Word with the water in Baptism. The font reminds us of the wonderful gift of God's forgiveness. It also reminds us that our old sinful self has been drowned, and a new person arises to live in faith!
